## Introduction to Hyderabad and Surroundings

A small, but excellent guide to Hyderabad can be found in many bookshops: Hyderabad, published by Disha Books. Look for a small silver-colored book about 4 by 6 inches in size, with red lettering on the cover. This book has a very informative section about all the major and minor places of both historic and modern interest in the Hyderabad area. It has an excellent map of the city, laid out in grids; and lots of useful and interesting information. It is highly recommended as a supplement to this guide.

## History

Megalithic circle tombs near Secunderabad and simple stone tools found at Patancheru are evidence of the earliest scattered settlements in the area around today's busy city of Hyderabad.

By the 2nd century A D, Nagarjuna, south of Hyderabad, was a center for Buddhist pilgrims from China and southeast Asia. Some nine centuries later the Jain rulers, the Chalukyas, made nearby Patancheru the capital of their empire for a short time. In the 11th century, Muslim invaders, bringing with them both Persian and Arab cultural heritages, began to dominate the tiny kingdoms of the Deccan, and it was they who founded the Bahamani kingdom in the 13th century.

In 1512 the Qutb Shahi kings seized the reins of power from the disintegrating Bahamani kingdom, and from the fortress city of Golconda, established their rule over the predominantly Hindu rural population of the area.

Both the kingdom and the city flourished. Ibrahim Qutb Shah's bridge over the Musi River,

known as the Purana Pul, was praised by the intrepid 17th century trader and adventurer Jean-Baptiste Tavernier, who compared it with the Pont Neuf in Paris. He also commented on the good fish from the many reservoirs in the kingdom, including Husain Sagar.

Water supplies for Golconda were inadequate, however, and epidemics of plague and cholera were frequent. The nobles appealed to Muhammad Quli Qutb Shah to build a new city, and in 1591 Hyderabad was laid out on the grid system then popular with Persian city planners.

The new city was on open land east of the fort on the main trade route to Machilipatnam, the great trading center of the kingdom and India's only deepwater port on the east coast at that time. At its center stood the Charminar, the Four Towers, a commemorative archway that art historian Percy Brown has described as the outstanding architectural monument of the Qutb Shahi period.

Successful businesses in diamonds, pearls, steel, and printed fabric known as kalamkari, or chintz, were transferred from the old fortress community to the bazars of the new city. In the city there were many new palaces as well as spacious gardens. One such garden, the Bagh-i-Dilkusha, the "garden of heart's happiness," covered an area of more than 14 square kilometers, from present-day Bashirbagh to the Musi River.

Tavernier's description of the changing of the guard in his book, Travels in India, written more than 300 years ago, gives us an idea of the colorful life in the bazar:

"The principal nobles mount guard every Monday, each in his tour, and they are not relieved before the end of a week. Some of these nobles command 5.000 or 6.000 horses, and encamp under tents around the town. When they mount guard each goes from his home to the rendezvous, but when they leave it they march in good order across the bridge, and thence by the main street they assemble in the square in front of the balcony. In the van ten or twelve elephants march, the number representing the rank of the officer who goes off guard. Some of them bear cages (howdahs) somewhat resembling the body of a small coach, while others carry only their drivers, and another man who holds a sort of banner in place of the cage.

"After the elephants the camels follow two by two, sometimes up to thirty or forty. Each camel has its saddle and on it is fixed a small culver in which a man, clad in a skin from head to foot, like a pantaloon, and seated on the crupper of the camel with a lighted match in hand, quickly turns from side to side before the balcony where the King is seated.

"After them come the carriages, around which the servants walk on foot, after which the ledhorses appear, and finally the noble to whom this whole equipment belongs, preceded by ten or twelve courtesans, who await him at the end of the bridge, leaping and dancing before him up to the square. After him the cavalry and infantry follow in good order. And as all that affords a spectacle, and has something of Pomp about it that amuses me...."

Hyderabad's initial period of prosperity came to an abrupt end in 1650 with the Mughal ruler Aurangzeb's first seige of Golconda. The people of the new city fled into the fort for protection from the armies of this emperor, who coveted the

area's wealth to supplement his income from Aurangabad, to the northwest.

At one time Shah Jehan, Aurangzeb's father (who built the Taj Mahal at Agra), had been friendly with the Qutb Shahi kings and protected them from his ambitious heir. But the old man was imprisoned by his son and Golconda's protection vanished; in 1687 it was annexed to Aurangzeb's realms and administered from Aurangabad. Hyderabad's importance as an administrative and economic center declined and the city fell into partial ruin.

Aurangzeb continued the construction of Mecca Masjid, the mosque that had been started in 1614. But it is said that the towers of the structure are stunted because the emperor, not having the love of beautiful architecture for which his father was famed, would not provide adequate funds for the taller minars that were originally planned. By 1724 the Mughal empire was disintegrating and Asaf Jah 1, Nizam-ul-Mulk the ruler of the Deccan country, broke away and established himself as virtually independent ruler of the southern realms. Hyderabad again became the capital in 1763 when the then Nizam realized that the eastern Deccan could be better ruled from there than from Aurangabad. Courtiers returned to the city, commerce and construction resumed; and the road north of Charminar became, as it is today, a major business district.

Population growth shifted in a new direction when the Subsidiary Alliance for military and political cooperation with the British East India Company was signed in 1798. On a ridge north of Husain Sagar across from Hyderabad some 5000 British troops were camped in the military cantonment; in 1806 this area was given the name of Secunderabad in honor of then Nizam Secunder Jah.

Within 50 years the cantonment had expanded to 50 000, and the area around it had become a thriving city. The Indian portion was called General Bazar and merchants there took advantage of concessions under the Subsidiary Alliance, now with the Crown rather than the East India Company, which permitted import of many commodities duty free. Cantonment personnel as well as the wealthy people of Hyderabad patronized Secunderabad merchants and the increased commerce resulted in rapid, chaotic growth of the community to the south toward Hyderabad.

The British Residency, today the home of the University College for Women, was completed in Hyderabad in 1806 and stimulated growth of a settlement for bankers, civil servants, and Europeans who worked for the Nizam's government. This area is now called Sultan Bazar and Chadarghat.

On a hill north of the Abids shopping area, the French built a gun casting factory; and today the area is still known as Gunfoundry. Indian Christians established their community in that area with schools and churches, which are still concentrated there. Two new bridges were built to cross the Musi River at Chadarghat and Afzalganj. The latter, known as Naya Pul or New Bridge, was the major link between the Nizam's Hyderabad on the south and the new suburbs of Begum Bazar and Sultan Bazar, north of the river.

When the Musi flooded in 1908, devastating the populated areas along the river banks, the Nizam moved his palace and a number of state offfices to King Koti, leaving the old walled city of Hyderabad behind.

River banks within the city were raised to 30 feet and the land along the water made into

parks. The High Court, Osmania General Hospital, and the State Library were built on the new high banks. To control future floods and to add to the city's water supply, the Osman Sagar and Himayat Sagar reservoirs were built.

Hyderabad continued its growth to the north as the suburbs on Raj Bhavan Road were settled in the 1930s, followed later by the first settlements in Banjara Hills and eventually in rocky Jubilee Hills. Secunderabad had its share of renovation. Crowded James Street, now Mahatma Gandhi Road, was finally supplemented when the Kingsway (now Rashtrapathi Road) was constructed as the only true thoroughfare in the busy business area.

Independence came to India in August 1947. Hyderabad, the largest of the princely states before independence, joined the Indian Union in 1948, with the city as its capital. Some Muslims from the governing class during the Nizam's rule left for Pakistan, but present-day Hyderabad still has a large Muslim population active in business and cultural affairs.

When the Telugu-speaking State of Andhra Pradesh was created in 1956 from the former states of Madras and Hyderabad, the city of Hyderabad became its capital. Marathi- and Kannada-speaking portions of the former state became parts of Maharashtra and Karnataka to the west.

Hyderabad is now over 400 years old. It is a bustling metropolis where multistoried buildings and wide streets contrast with narrow lanes and old buildings dating back to the Qutb Shahi kings; where modern factories belch forth the smoke of industry and cottage workers turn out some of the finest handmade crafts in the world; where ox carts jostle with diesel lorries; and where old and new India are one.

Khaja Abid, grandfather of Asaf Jah I, was born in Ali-Abad, in the neighborhood of Samarkhand, in the Kingdom of Bukhara (present day Uzbekistan). His mother was from the family of Mir Hamdan of Samarkhand. His father, Alam Shiek, originally came from Suhraward, a small

town in Kurdistan, and traced his descent to Shiek Shihabuddin, a great spiritual teacher and founder of one of the Sufi schools in Islam.

Shihabuddin called himself a descendant of Abu Bakr, the first Caliph of Islam, who succeeded the Prophet.

Khaja Abid first came to India in 1654-55, in the twenty-ninth year of the Emperor Shajehan's reign. He was offered a post in the Imperial service. He rose to high office in the reign of the Emperor Aurangazeb, who succeeded his father, Shahjehan.

## **Crafts and Cottage Industries**

#### **Bidriware**

The craft of making bidri metal objects developed in the fortress town of Bidar, near Hyderabad, and has been established in India for more than 400 years. It originated in Iran and Syria during Mughal times.

Metal used for the base is an alloy of zinc and copper. After casting and molding, the surface is filed smooth. It is then temporarily blackened with a copper sulfate solution and etched in a traditional design by using a sharp iron tool. Silver, either wire or in thin sheets, is beaten into the design grooves and the temporary black surface removed.

During the final oxidation process, the shiny surface is briefly heated and rubbed with a thick paste of ammonium chloride mixed with clay from the walls of Bidar Fort.

The result is a remarkable black matte base that contrasts with the shining silver inlay design. The final step is using groundnut or coconut oil to polish the item, which may be a vase, bangle, or delicate box. This ancient process can be observed at Mumtaz Bidri Works Coop Society, 22-1-1042 Dar-ush-Shifa, Hyderabad (tel 523843) or Yaqoob Brothers, 995 Habeeb Nagar, Hyderabad (tel 221163).

#### Nirmalware

Nirmal lacquerware is one of the crafts for which the Hyderabad area is noted. Wood or composition board is painted with designs and pictures, after which a brilliant, lustrous lacquer is applied. Toys, pictures, trays, and furniture are currently being made using lacquered wood. Older pieces that are occasionally found have a lovely muted glow. The factory and showroom of Nirmal In-

dustries is in Khairatabad, on the left side of the main road between Panjagutta and downtown Hyderabad; visitors are welcome to watch the precise workmanship.

#### **Handloom Fabrics**

Four major design techniques dominate the handloom cottons and silks for which Andhra Pradesh is famed.

Ikkat weaving involves tying and dyeing the yarn into a design before it is woven. The warp carries the design and it undergoes successive dyeings depending on the number of colors and intricacy of the design. Double ikkat is a special design where both the weft and warp threads are dyed for a two-way pattern. The villages of Pochampally and Koyalgudem are noted centers for ikkat weaving, which is carried out as a family enterprise by residents of the two communities.

Himroo weaving is a traditional cottage industry that originated in Aurangabad. The weavers produce a brocade-like fabric in cotton or silk, usually in floral designs, which typically incorporates gold thread. Himroo weaving can be seen near the bidri factory and at Deccan Exports in the village of Dargah, on the Old Bombay Road (A-27).

Block printing is the technique of printing a design on cotton or silk using a series of hand-carved wooden blocks. Chemical or vegetable dyes are used. The colors develop after washing, boiling, or steaming, then drying in bright sunlight. Hyderabad has been a center of block printing for about 75 years, and designs were initially influenced by the Persian school but in recent years the Lepakshi temple designs of South India have been adapted for a more commercial market. Manjira Designs, Road 11, Banjara Hills (B-50), welcomes visitors to watch the process.

Kalamkari, the fourth of these techniques, gained popularity during the 15th century in Andhra and is divided into two schools. The Machilipatnam school, named for a village on the east coast, uses block prints to create design outlines on cotton fabric. These are then filled in with color using a pen or "kalam". The designs are used for bedspreads, wall hangings, and saris. The Kalahasti school, centered in a village in southeastern Andhra, produces works drawn completely by hand and painted in vegetable colors. This work is largely used for wall hangings depicting stories from Indian mythology.

Handicrafts from all over India are shown at the annual All-India Industrial Exhibition each year from early January to mid-February on the Exhibition Grounds, Mukarramjahi Road, Hyderabad (C-29). In addition to discount sales, there are educational displays and an amusement park for children. All the handcrafted products described here are also usually available at Lepakshi and other shops listed in the Handicraft section of the Shopping Guide.

## Clothing

In the bazars of Hyderabad and Secunderabad, the varied dress of the people reflects the groups who live here. Along Abid Road women in vividly colored saris dominate the scene. The sari is five meters of cotton, silk, brocade, or synthetic fabric that comes in every color and design imaginable, with no two ever alike - a tribute to the textile industry of India. It is folded into pleats and tucked into the waist of a full-length petticoat, which matches or complements the color of the sari. The end of the sari is usually draped over the left shoulder; it is called the pallu and is the most intricately designed part of the sari. The blouse worn with the sari is called a choli.

salvar kameez originally came from The North India, and is frequently worn by women of all ages. Salvars are wide-waisted trousers, full at the hips and tapered at the ankle. They are tied at the waist with a drawstring and topped by a kameez, a long, fitted tunic in a matching or a contrasting color. The bright scarf tossed across the throat with the ends hanging down the back is a dupatta. Churidars, tight-fitting trousers with small folds around the ankles, are worn with kurtas, loose shirts that are knee-length or longer. Very young Telugu girls wear long skirts called langa with matching blouses; at adolescence they add an oni wrapped around the torso and draped over the left shoulder.

Around Charminar, many Muslim women can be seen wearing the burqa. It is a dark garment, usually black, with a separate hood and covers the clothing completely. Their faces may be totally or partially veiled.

At many construction sites in the area, Banjara women can be seen doing heavy labor in colorful ghagaras, full skirts, usually red, with extensive mirror work at the border. With this they wear a backless choli and an odhni or shawl, also red and decorated with mirror work. Banjara women also wear heavy silver earrings and hair adornments and their arms are frequently covered up to the elbow with silver, ivory, or plastic bracelets.

The bangles worn by an Indian woman are carefully chosen to harmonize with her outfit, and though gold is preferred for elegant occasions, the studded glass bangles sold in shops in Laad Bazar near Charminar are a Hyderabad speciality. These come in a bewildering array of colors and designs. The two most common designs are kabutar ankh or "pigeon's eye" - three rows of stones with a different colored stone in

the middle, and simitisarak "cementstreet" - a flat white design on a metallic base. Look for the lac bangles made from resin, which come in colorful designs, also made in Hyderabad.

Men's clothing, like women's, reflects the varied cultural backgrounds of Hyderabadis. By day, the business and government communities usually wear Western attire. Also seen in the street are men wearing the dhoti, a white piece of muslin about four meters long, wrapped between the legs and tucked into the waist. Kurtas or jubbas are usually worn with the dhoti. Color in the streets is supplied by men wearing the lungi, a two-meter piece of brightly checked or striped cotton. It is pleated and tied at the waist and falls straight to the feet, or is often seen tucked up around the waist for more utilitarian knee-length use. Pyjamas, pants with a drawstring waist, are common for both leisure and day wear when topped with a kurta. In their homes, even the most staid businessmen wear dhotis, lungis, or pyjama kurtas.

On formal occasions, some men appear in the sherwani, a tightly fitted knee-length coat of silk or wool with a stand-up collar, and worn with white churidars. At formal occasions in Hyderabad both men and women wear beautiful pearls - the women necklaces, the men studs for their kurtas. The city has long been the center for pearls, and in his book, Tavernier describes the marketing here of pearls from Ceylon, Japan, and the West Indies by way of Europe. "Basra pearls," the old pearls from the Persian Gulf, can sometimes still be bought in the pearl market.

#### Cuisine

Hyderabad is known for its unique blend of the foods and spices of both North and South India. The cooking of North India is characterized by a relatively greater use of dried spices, whereas the dishes of South India more often rely on green herbs. The combination of spices for any particular dish is called masala. A garam masala is a combination of cardamom, cinnamon, cloves, cumin, and coriander seeds, all ground into a powder. It is used as an accent, particularly in the dishes of North India.

Some Hindus prefer vegetarian dishes, and Hyderabadi cuisine is part of this tradition. The basic ingredients here are rice, wheat, legumes, and vegetables. Vegetarian meals are usually served on a thali, a stainless steel tray upon which are placed a number of small bowls called katoris. Each katori contains a vegetable or dal preparation and in the center of the tray is a large mound of plain, cooked rice. One common vegetable combination is guju: potatoes, beans, carrots, and cauliflower stewed with dahi or curd (yogurt) and coconut. A chutney of coconut, green chillies, tamarind, and mint ground into a paste is often served. Papads, also called pappadadis or pappadams, are very light, crisp chickpea flour wafers, which are served throughout the meal, and a bowl of plain curd is usually offered at the end.

Idlis are steamed breads of rice and black dal: the grains are soaked, fermented, and pulverized, then formed into flattened cupcake shapes before cooking. They are usually served at breakfast and as snacks or tiffin with sambhar, a thick soup of pigeonpea dal and vegetables spiced with sour tamarind. Sambhar is not to be confused with rasam, a lentil-based consomme flavored with tamarind that is usually very hot and spicy. Dosas are thin, crispy pancake-like breads made from pulverized rice and dal that has fermented. When filled with a spicy potato curry it is called masala dosa. The taste of these preparations is

characterized by fresh green masala, a combination of green coriander, green chillies, mint, curry leaves, fresh fenugreek, green onion, and other spices.

Two specialities of Hyderabad are baghara baigan, small eggplants stuffed with spices and cooked in a sauce flavored with tamarind, groundnut, and sesame; and mirchi ka salan, stuffed large green chillies in a similar sauce.

The city is noted for fine Mughalai cuisine. At a chowki dinner guests are seated on thin mattresses and bolsters at a low, square table and served such appetizers as tikka kabab, pieces of boned chicken rubbed with masala and then grilled in a tandoor, and pathar ka gosht, strips of lamb or mutton which have been marinated in masala and then grilled on heated stones. The main course is often biryani, a mixture of rice and meat or chicken cooked with green masala. Haleem, a mildly spiced mutton and wheat preparation, is a special dish traditionally eaten during the month of Ramzan, when devout Muslims fast during the daylight hours and dine after sundown. Other meat dishes commonly served are shami kababs, spicy meat balls, and nargesi kababs, ground meat with egg. Khobani kameeta, dried apricots cooked to a puree, is a favorite dessert. On festive occasions biryanis and puddings are sometimes decorated with finely beaten sheets of silver, which is consumed along with the delicacy. Artisans in the area behind Charminar prepare the metal, thinner than the finest paper, especially for culinary use.

An evening dinner party would not be properly concluded without an offering of paan: pieces of areca nut, coconut, cardamom, cloves, a little lime paste, or even tobacco, all enclosed in a betel leaf folded into a small cone shape, and which leaves a refreshing taste in the mouth.

Early in the morning in Hyderabad, as well as throughout the day, good, rich South Indian coffee is nearly always available. Both tea and coffee are served with hot milk and sugar.

Anyone with sharp eves cannot miss seeing the numerous chaat bhandars, small pushcarts with glassed in sides which appear on the streets around lunchtime and stay out until late in the evening. Chaat is traditional fast food sold right on the street. While it did not originate in Hyderabad, it is also a part of the cuisine scene for anyone adventurous enough to try it. dishes are quickly assembled using ingredients such as chhole (chickpea curry), potato curry, tamarind sauce, curd, papris (fried wafers), pani puris (wafers in the shape of a ball and hollow inside), and sev, a type of fried noodle. Jal jheera is a special drink sold during the hot season and served in pani puris.

## Festivals and Holidays

Religious festivals in Hyderabad are characterized by prayers, feasts with family and friends, new clothing, and processions. In many cases, the dates vary because both Islamic and Hindu years are based on the lunar calendar. Islamic festivals are celebrated nearly two weeks earlier from one year to the next, and certain major observances can occur in any month of the year.

## January

Sankranti. This Hindu festival marking the end of the harvest season is the time for flying kites, which are then cut free to signify the removal of evil from the home. Entrances are decorated with rangoli, delicate designs made with chalk and colored powder. Sesame seeds are used both to flavor sweets, and to mix with bath water.

**Republic Day.** On 26 January 1950, India was proclaimed a republic, and this day is now marked annually with military parades and cultural pageants.

## **February**

Mahashivratri is a day of fasting in honor of Lord Shiva, who forms a part of the Trinity: Brahma, the Creator of the Universe, Vishnu, the Preserver, and Shiva, the Destroyer. Hindus usually fast for 24 hours, often staying awake through the night chanting mantras or sacred hymns in front of the Shiva Linga, which symbolizes Lord Shiva.

#### March

Holi is a Hindu festival celebrating the advent of spring. It is a day for tossing colored powder and water at friends and acquaintances. On the eve of Holi there are huge bonfires to symbolize the burning of the mythological figure, Holika, and the destruction of evil.

## **April**

Ugadi is the beginning of the Telugu New Year and acclaims Shalivahana, the son of a potter. New calendars are consecrated on this day. The traditional drink is pachadi, a mixture of unripe mango, neem flower, and brown sugar or jaggery in tamarind juice representing the sour, bitter, and sweet things a new year is bound to bring. Easter is the celebration by the Christian community of the resurrection of Christ.

Mahavir Jayanti is the birth anniversary of Vardhamana Mahavira, who was the last Thirthankar (saint) of the Jains.

#### June

Id-ul-Fitr (Ramzan Id) is an Islamic holiday, and the entire month of Ramzan is a time of daily

fasting from sunrise to sunset. This holy time is not always observed in June, as its dates change every year in accordance with the moon. The Prophet Muhammad is said to have commanded fasting to counter growing gluttony, which threatened the health of his people during the seventh century. When the new moon is sighted at the end of the month, the Id is joyfully celebrated to mark the end of the period of abstinence; it is a time for visiting and eating sheer khurma, a thick, sweet dish that is served to guests.

## August

**Independence Day.** On 15 August 1947 India's long struggle for freedom from British rule was won.

Id-ul-Zuha (Bakr-ld) commemorates Ibrahim's obedience to God's order for him to sacrifice his son, Ismael, as a sign of his faith. According to the traditional account, when Ibrahim removed the blindfold he had donned to carry out the difficult assignment, he found his son safely at his side and a slain ram on the altar. Muslims usually feast on slaughtered ram or goat on the Id-ul-Zuha,

**Rakhi** is an occasion for siblings to show their mutual affection. The sister ties a bright decoration around her brother's wrist to symbolize the bond between them. He then gives her a gift as an indication of his lifelong love, protection, and responsibility for her welfare.

## September

Vinayak Chathurthi is the popular Hindu fete to Ganesh, the jolly pot-bellied elephant-headed god of wisdom and prosperity who is often shown sitting on or near his mount - a tiny rat. Ganesh is invoked before beginning anything, whether it is work or prayers, since he is believed to remove obstacles to success.

During the Ganesh festival, families install a clay image of the god in their homes and decorate it with flowers, ornaments, and lights. Each day that the image remains in the home, the family performs puja, ceremonial worship, before it. On the last day of the festival, which may last from 1 to 21 days, the clay idol is carried in a lively procession through the streets to be immersed in a river, tank, lake, or the sea. In addition to family Ganesh ceremonies, there are also community processions throughout the city.

Muharram is the 10-day period of intense mourning for Shia Muslims marking the martyrdom of Imam Hussain, the Prophet Muhammad's grandson. He was killed on the plain of Karbala while traveling to Damascus to assert his claim to the caliphate. Ashura, the 10th day, is a time of total fasting and of penitential processions of young men.

#### **October**

Gandhi Jayanti. The 2nd of October is the anniversary of the birth of Mohandas K Gandhi, known as Mahatma Gandhi, the father of modern India.

**Vijayadasami** is a 10-day Hindu festival celebrating the triumph of good over evil. It is based on Rama's victory over the King Ravana, who had kidnapped Rama's wife, Sita. The Ramayana is enacted for nine nights and on Dassera, the 10th day, Hindu homes and cars are decked with marigolds, tools and books are rededicated to the deities, and new clothes are worn.

Dassera also coincides with Durga puja, which is observed only by Bengalis.

**Diwali** is named for the Sanskrit word **deepawali**, meaning "row of lamps". It is a joy-

ous Hindu festival, with homes brightly illuminated and the constant sound of exploding firecrackers. Everyone wears colorful clothes and visits friends and family as well as throwing colored powder and water. The festival begins early in the day, when women bathe in sweet oil and then pass small lighted oil lamps before the faces of the the men in the family. The lighting of these earthen lamps is prefaced with the worship of Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth and good fortune.

#### November

Andhra Pradesh Formation Day. 1 November commemorates the creation of the province in 1956, uniting the Telugu-speaking populations of the former South Indian states of Madras, Mysore, and Hyderabad.

#### December

Christmas. 25 December is the day when Christians celebrate the birth of Christ in Bethlehem, and this holiday, with its tradition of gift giving, is popular even among non-Christian city dwellers.

## **Interesting Sights**

#### Golconda Fort

The 13th century Golconda Fort (A-17) is dramatic and impressive. Originally built by the Kakatiyas as a small fort, Golconda was expanded and strengthened by the Qutb Shahis. Today the old Muslim fort has been invaded only by a bright Hindu temple, juxtapositioned near the top of the hill. The remains of the ancient water system by which water was moved through laminated clay pipes from ground level to hanging gardens above are still evident. The acoustics of the

fort are such that from the Durbar Hall at the very top of the fort you can hear hands being clapped some 380 steps below in the Grand Portico of the Bala Hissar near the entry gate. There is now a Sound and Light show at the fort that is well worth seeing. From November to February it is from 1830 to 1930, and March to October, 1900 to 2000. The show is in English on Sundays and Wednesdays, in Hindi on Tuesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays, and in Telugu on Thursdays. booking office at the fort opens daily at 1730. Oneday advance booking can be made at the A P State Travel and Tourism Development Corporation at Yatri Nivas, Sardar Patel Road, Secunderabad from 1000 to 1200. Admission is Rs 15 for adults and Rs 10 for children aged 5-12 years.

#### **Qutb Shahi Tombs**

Within a kilometer to the north of Golconda Fort lie the stately tombs of the Qutb Shahi dynasty (A-18). Originally covered with intense blue and emerald green tiles, these onion-shaped domes have now lost their tiles and reflect the effects of pollution. In the center of each tomb is the sarcophagus, an imitation of the burial vault that lies in a crypt below. Open daily from 0930 to 1630, and closed on Fridays.

## Paigah Tombs

These are the tombs of the Paigah nobles who served under the Nizams of Hyderabad some 200 years ago (A-23). The exteriors of these tombs are relatively simple while the interiors are intricately carved. They are located beyond Malakpet in Santosh Nagar, through a narrow lane opposite the Deccan Medical College.

#### Birla Mandir

Built by the Birla Trust in 1976, this Hindu temple (Map B) is constructed of white Rajasthani marble and overlooks the Tank Bund: the view at sunset is beautiful

#### Birla Planetarium and Science Centre

Recent additions to Hyderabad's attractions, these modern sights are located next to the Birla Mandir, in the center of Hyderabad. Interesting and fun, these are good places to take children.

#### Monda Market

A visit to this market (Map D) is a must for anyone who really wants to experience Hyderabad. It's a great way to get a taste of food shopping, Indian-style, with lots of colorful people and vegetables midst a flurry of business and chatter. Located in Secunderabad, off Rashtrapathi Road.

## Husain Sagar

The lake joins the twin cities of Hyderabad and Secunderabad with a 3-km dam or "bund". It was built in 1562 under the supervision of Husain Shah, brother-in-law of the king at that time. Husain was regarded as a saint and is entombed a short distance from the Outb Shahi tombs.

Below the bund is Indira Park (Map B) with lawns, rose gardens, waterways and pavilions; a lovely spot for picnics and walks. To reach the park take the Lower Tank Bund Road from Secretariat Road. Turn right at first large street just before Lower Tank Bund Road divides. The first left after that will take you to the main entrance and parking area.

Sanjivayya Park (Map D) is also a picturesque spot for a picnic, located on a peninsula of Husain Sagar. It can be reached from Ministers Road, which runs between Mahatma Gandhi Road near the Sailing Club and Sardar Patel Road.

At the south end of the bund, close to the Secretariat, is the new Lumbini Park, from which one can take an excursion by boat to the large Buddha Statue recently erected in the middle of the lake.

#### Charminar

Literally meaning "four minars", Charminar (C-54) was built in 1592 by the fifth Qutb Shah to mark the center of the Old City of Hyderabad. On top of Charminar is an old mosque and a view of the bustling Old City. It is surrounded by the bazars of silversmiths, bangles, embroidery shops, marriage outfitters, perfume merchants, antique dealers, and pearl and jewellery shops.

#### Laad Bazar (Bangle Alley)

A short walk from Charminar (Map C) will take you to this narrow alley full of colorful, sparkling glass and metal bangles typical of Hyderabad. They're fragile! Look for the lac bangles, also a Hyderabadi speciality.

## Mecca Masjid

Situated close to Charminar, this is the biggest mosque, or masjid, in Hyderabad (Map C), and has a capacity of accomodating up to 10000 people! It was begun in 1617 by Sultan Mohammed Qutb Shah and finished by the Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb in 1694, nearly 77 years later. The masjid is said to contain a hair of the Prophet Mohammed; some bricks that are said to be made of soil brought from Mecca are visible over the main arch. For those Hyderabadis who will never make the pilgrimage to Mecca itself, this is next best thing. The masjid is an interesting glimpse of Muslim life: visitors must remove their shoes and women should be properly covered, i.e., no bare shoulders or legs.

#### Falaknuma Palace

Set prominently on a hill overlooking Hyderabad, this magnificent palace (A-10) was designed by an Italian, built by a Paigah noble in 1892, and later purchased by the Nizam, Mahboob Ali Khan. Many Royal guests have stayed at the Palace, which maintains a reminiscence of grandeur with its jade collection, elegant furniture, paintings, and draperies.

The Palace is now managed by the Nizam's Trust, who grant entrance at their own discretion. To organize a visit, contact the Trust at tel 234252.

#### Salarjung Museum

The private collection of Nawab Salar Jung III, nobleman and Prime Minister of the Nizam of Hyderabad, is displayed somewhat unusually in this old museum (Map C). The collection includes crystal, porcelain, statuary, jewelry, Arabic and Persian manuscripts, weapons, clocks and more. The jade collection and the Indian miniature paintings are the highlight. Open from 1000 to 1700 daily, closed Fridays.

#### Purana Pul and Naya Pul

These are two of the four bridges over the Musi River (Map A). Purana Pul, built in 1578, was considered a marvel in its day, when Ibrahim Qutb Shah had it built to extend the limits of the old city of Golconda to include Hyderabad. Naya Pul, more commonly used to cross the river today, offers a striking view of the Osmania Hospital and the High Courts facing each other across the banks of the Musi.

#### **Public Gardens**

Near Lal Bahadur Stadium, these gardens (Map C) offer a view of rare plants, a Cyprus garden,

and a small lake. A number of important buildings stand within the park walls, including the Andhra Pradesh State Legislative Assembly, with its striking Rajasthani and Persian architectural styles.

The State Archaelogical Museum is in the grounds of the gardens as well, with a collection that dates back to the 12th century. Open from 1030 to 1700, it is closed Mondays and public holidays.

## Nehru Zoological Park

This large zoo (A-11) has over 300 different species of birds and animals, including a Lion Safari Park. It is an excellent place for a pleasant daylong outing. To reach the zoo, cross the Musi River at Naya Pul, turn right at the Madina Hotel, go past the High Courts, and get on the Bangalore Highway. The zoo will be on your right. The curator is K N Benarji, tel 523355.

## **Outside Hyderabad**

## Pochampally and Koyalagudem

These two villages are about  $1^{1}/_{2}$  hour's drive (50 km) from Hyderabad, on the Vijayawada Road. They are the centers for ikkat weaving, the method in which silk and cotton threads are tied and dyed before being woven into carefully planned geometric patterns. This ancient form of weaving is a family industry, with men, women, and children working together in the open courtyards and in their houses to produce fabric that is renowned throughout the world. Koyalagudem is a quiet, clean, quaint village, whereas Pochampally is more developed and less personal.

## Nargajunasagar and Nargajunakonda

Nargajunasagar Dam on the Krishna River, 150 km southeast of Hyderabad, is the highest masonry dam in the world; it is used to irrigate more than two million hectares of arid and semiarid land in Andhra Pradesh, and for hydro-electric power. Travel time to Nagarjunasagar from Hyderabad is about 4 hours one way.

Nargajunakonda (Nargajuna Hill) was a major Buddhist center in the 2nd and 3rd centuries, with monasteries, stupas, and a palace. Ruins of the city were excavated before the reservoir was flooded, and reassembled on the remaining island above water level in a museum designed to resemble a Buddhist monastery, or "vihar". Also present on the island is a mahastupa, containing actual relicts of the Buddha. The island and temple can be reached by boat on the right bank of the Krishna. Guest house accomodation is available on the dam site at Vijayapuri, a small town to the north.

#### Bidar

The walled city of Bidar is about 130 km from Hyderabad, a pleasant drive of approximately three hours through the agricultural countryside. The vast Bidar Fort is on a high point at the edge of the Deccan Plateau, overlooking a flat plain that stretches off to the horizon. First ruled by the Chalukyans and later by the Kakativas, some of the fortifications may date back to the 11th century. Most of the fort dates from the 14th to the 17th centuries, during which time it was ruled first by the Bahmanis and then by the Barid Shahis. The "madrasa", or college of Khwaja Mahmud Gawan, inside the town of Bidar, has been partially restored and you can see traces of Koranic verses on the blue and white glazed tiles on the facade.

Tombs of 12 Bahamani kings stand in the village of Ashtur, just northeast of the town. Bidriware is made using lateritic soil from

crumbling walls of the ancient fortress and can be found in several shops.

## Warangal and Ramappa

It is possible to visit Warangal in one day, but the round trip of 450 km requires about 8 hours on the road.

This ancient and interesting capital of the Kakatiyas is over 1000 years old and is well worth spending more than just a few hours on. Some particularly interesting sights are the famous Ramappa Temple, the Warangal Fort, and the Thousand-Pillared Temple at Hanamkonda.

Ramappa Temple (70 km from Hanamkonda via Molug and Parakala) is a striking star-shaped building in the lavish manner of the Hoysalas. It is considered a gem of medieval Deccan architec-

ture. The great pillars in the temple are intricately carved, smooth and shining, and the walls are covered in bas relief scenes from the Mahabharata and Ramayana showing lively groups of dancers, musicians and warriors. Nearby is an irrigation tank built in the same period and still in use. It is a scenic spot, excellent for a picnic luncheon.

The Warangal Fort, although now largely in ruins, is over 700 years old. Traces of the walls of the ancient city can be seen, with imposing gateways and delicately chiselled friezes and borders.

The Thousand-Pillared Temple at Hanam-konda was built around 1162. One of the features of the temple is a striking Nandi - Shiva's vehicle - carved from black basalt. The thousand pillars are actually carved on the outer walls of the temple.

## **Health Hints**

## Drinking water

Boil briskly for 5 minutes, filter to remove sediment. Use only boiled water for ice cubes.

## Fresh fruit and vegetables

Wash with soap and water to remove dirt, rinse with boiled water and dry completely. Some pre-

fer to soak for 30 minutes in water treated with Lugol's Solution (tincture of iodine) or potassium permanganate after washing and rinsing.

#### Milk

Boil local whole milk for 20 minutes. Powdered milk should be reconstituted only with boiled water. UHT milk is safe to use straight from the container. Milk from plastic bags should be boiled before using.

#### Meats

Cook until well done. Any meat that you plan to undercook should be deep frozen for a few weeks prior to cooking to kill any parasites.

## **Eating out**

Avoid uncooked foods or items which have been left unrefrigerated for a period of time. Request bottled drinks or tea or coffee and beware of ice cubes unless you are certain they were made with boiled water.

## Injuries

Avoid infections by washing any cut or wound immediately with soap and boiled water and check with a doctor to find out if you need a tetanus booster.

#### **Animal bites**

Wash the bite immediately with running water and soap for 10 minutes, then seek prompt medical attention. Rabies can be contracted from any animal bite.

#### Medications

Most routine medications are available at pharmacies; check the expiration date on the label.

There are numerous Indian radio channels, but not many English broadcasts. The daily papers give program details and times. Radio Australia and London Calling are available. For program details write to the respective High Commissions or ask around. On shortwave bands, radio broadcasts can be found from a variety offoreign countries. Many programs are in English, such as the BBC and Voice of America, and many other countries like Japan and Netherlands also have English-language programs.

## **Transport**

#### **Buses**

The new, clean, modern buses in town are called Metro Liners, and are still inexpensive at twice the cost of the old buses. There are no timetables for either type of bus, so all you need to know is the location of your bus stop. Find this out from neighbors or friends, as well as which number bus you require to reach your destination. Buses run from 0530 to 2300, but should be avoided during rush hours: 0900 to 1000, and 1700 to 1800.

#### Auto Rickshaws

Bright yellow three-wheeled auto rickshaws are readily available, usually outside hotels, restaurants, railway stations, and the airport. They cannot be ordered by telephone. They are metered, with a small minimum charge, and the total fare is determined by distance travelled. The maximum load is supposedly three persons, though you will occasionally see them carrying many more. An auto driver might decline to take a foreigner at the metered rate (to which, incidentally, should be added an extra 10% - this is the current surcharge as of December 1995), and instead try to hold out for a set price, often two or three times the metered rate.

#### **Taxis**

A few taxis are available outside hotels, some restaurants, railways stations and at the airport, but there are presently no regular taxi stands. Taxis are not metered, so determine and bargain for the price before you get in. There are now a few car hire establishments available, but they may require a bit of time in advance to arrange for a vehicle, and will usually include a driver for the car.

## **About ICRISAT**

The semi-arid tropics (SAT) encompasses pans of 48 developing countries including most of India, parts of southeast Asia, a swathe across sub-Saharan Africa, much of southern and eastern Africa, and parts of Latin America. Many of these countries are among the poorest in the world. Approximately one-sixth of the world's population lives in the SAT, which is typified by unpredictable weather, limited and erratic rainfall, and nutrient-poor soils.

ICRISAT's mandate crops are sorghum, pearl millet, finger millet, chickpea, pigeonpea, and groundnut; these six crops are vital to life for the ever-increasing populations of the semi-arid tropics. ICRISAT's mission is to conduct research which can lead to enhanced sustainable production of these crops and to improved management of the limited natural resources of the SAT. ICRISAT communicates information on technologies as they are developed through workshops, networks, training, library services, and publishing.

ICRISAT was established in 1972, and is one of 16 nonprofit, research and training centers funded through the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (CGIAR).
